

Sailing Weekends / Start Yachting

Course Outline

Sail Training Weekends are ideal for beginners to experience sailing a cruising yacht and complete the RYA 'Start Yachting' Course – the first step on the RYA Sail Training pathway. These weekends can also be used to complete RYA Competent Crew or Day Skipper practical courses and they are suitable to refresh or extend sailing skills or have coaching and an assessment for the International Certificate of Competence, or complete a Day Skipper tidal conversion. Weekends start and finish at Chatham Marina on the River Medway in Kent – less than 1 hour from Central London. Sailing weekends are residential in that you live aboard during the course.

Format for the weekend

You join the yacht at Chatham Marina at 2000 on Friday and meet the skipper/instructor and up to 4 other crew. The other crew may be first timers, or doing a series of weekends for a competent crew or day skipper course.

You will be shown around the boat, allocated a berth and, after a safety briefing by the skipper the course will begin. The first steps are usually to show you how to prepare the yacht to leave harbour so you will be immediately involved in handling ropes as you leave the marina berth and either practice coming back alongside or go out through the lock into the river. You will be involved 'hands-on' from the beginning as you work as a team to set and trim sails. Fairly soon we'll shut down the engine and you'll experience the thrill as the yacht responds to the power of wind in the sails. You might soon even find yourself helping the boat down the river – controlling the direction using the wind or the compass as reference. The first day is all about learning the ropes', how to steer the yacht, set and trim sails, tack and gybe and lots more. Meanwhile other students who may be working towards day skipper qualifications will be learning how to take charge of the deckwork and navigate the yacht safely out of the river and into the open sea. Lunch will be 'on-the-go'. On Saturday night we'll find a mooring or anchorage in the Medway and a well-earned, convivial dinner around the saloon table. On some weekends, weather permitting, we'll get alongside a landing or use the dinghy to get ashore to a pub to debrief over a pint. But if not we'll find a secluded creek to enjoy the special experience of a night aboard a yacht at anchor.

After a well-earned night's sleep and breakfast we'll get going again, consolidating what we learned the day before and extending knowledge and skill to things like emergencies at sea including man overboard drills and then an exhilarating sail back up river to Chatham. After another lunch 'on the go' we'll lock back into the marina by 1500 and after a clean-up of the boat and final debrief you will be saying goodbye to the others at about 1600 on the Sunday.

Our instructors are chosen for their experience, patience and understanding. Your instructor will show you how to do everything from the beginning so that you are able to participate right from the start. Although you will be working and exercising as part of a crew you will be given individual guidance and instruction. As each hour and day passes you will acquire new skills and grow in confidence.

The atmosphere aboard is relaxed and the emphasis is on having fun – exactly what sailing is supposed to be. At the same time there is lots to learn and some work to put in. At the end of a weekend you will be tired – yes – but also fulfilled and refreshed.

Our well-equipped yachts offer exciting sailing performance and comfortable, heated accommodation. Meals are all prepared from good quality and mostly fresh ingredients so you will eat well. If you enjoy wine or beer with an evening meal you can bring your own or contribute to a 'kitty' to buy some before leaving harbour.

We want you to enjoy your experience and of course we hope that you are going to want to continue with your sailing. If you wish, you can book two further weekends to complete the RYA competent crew course – the first step along a challenging and fascinating path as you learn about this wonderful sport. Alternatively you can switch to a 5 day course or even an adventure sailing holiday. Whatever you decide, we will be there to offer help and advice as you pursue your goals – be they boat ownership, charter, racing or cruising with us to new destinations.

Achievement

RYA Start Yachting Course Certificate. You will have made a big step towards the RYA Competent Crew standard.

What's Included

For residential courses the price includes a berth on the yacht (this may be in a shared cabin or a single berth in the saloon), all meals aboard from lunch on the first full day to lunch on the last day, tea, coffee etc and all operating expenses including berthing and fuel. (When comparing prices with other schools you may find that some meals are either not included or taken ashore at your expense and berthing costs may be charged to students). Water from the boat's tanks is drinkable. Alcoholic drinks, bottled water or other soft drinks are not included but you are welcome to bring your own. Often people contribute to a 'kitty' to buy some wine with dinner. Wet weather clothing hire (jackets and trousers) is available at £7 per day but capped at £25 for a single course or event. There are no other essential extras but you may want to buy one or two books (see below) and bring a little pocket money for use if you go ashore.

Facilities Aboard

The training yachts are all designed and certificated for 8 persons but we operate RYA courses with a maximum of 5 students to one instructors. Each yacht has 3 double cabins (2 aft and one forward), a saloon that seats up to 8 and converts to provide 2 single berths (on port and starboard sides), a galley with twin sinks, a twin burner gas stove and a refrigerator, and a single toilet/shower compartment. (Although there are washing facilities and you could take a shower if you want, as sailors we don't expect to shower every day). Berth allocations are made by the instructor when you join. Two of the crew may be asked to share a cabin.

The yachts all have 12 volt dc electrical systems including a limited capacity to charge mobile devices via a 12 volt USB socket. 230 volt ac power is available only when the yacht is alongside in a marina and connected to shore power.

What will I need to bring

We can provide wet weather clothing hire so the only things you may need to buy are a sleeping bag, pillow slip, suitable footwear (deck shoes or sea boots – although trainers are OK) and clothing to suit the weather and season. For a complete suggested packing list see Downloads.

Books

There is no essential reading before you come on the weekend. However, if you have never sailed before you might want to read through the RYA Competent Crew Course notes booklet. You might also want to buy a personal RYA Log Book. These books are available to buy at our base – or you can obtain it from the RYA website.
